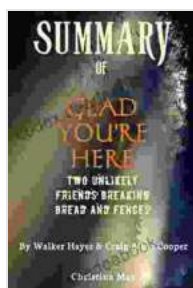


Two Unlikely Friends: Breaking Bread and Fences

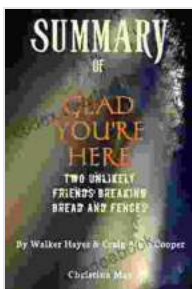

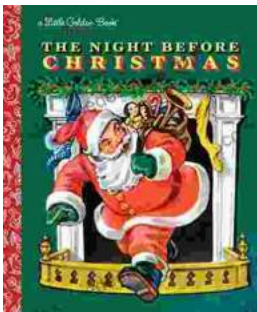

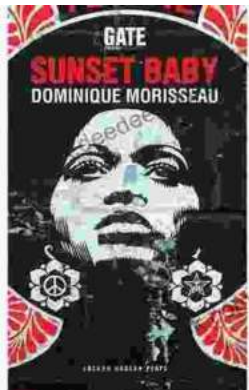
